

COSTA RICA'S OFFICIAL LANGUAGE IS


Spanish but a number of other languages are spoken including english, Limonese Creole, Bribí, Cabécar, Maléku Jaíka, Boruca, and Térraba.

**Travel to Costa Rica:
Things to know before traveling abroad**

DRESS FOR COMFORT

Costa Rica doesn't have a dress code so feel free to dress comfortable and casual. At the beach, wear mostly shorts, tank tops and flip flops. In the city, try closed toed shoes or hiking sandals, long pants and a light jacket or sweater. If visiting from high elevation areas, then long pants and a jacket are a must.

DINING ETIQUETTE

- Costa Ricans are famous for observing Tico time, known as "la hora tica." Costa Ricans arrive late, by around 30 minutes or more, to dinner, appointments, and other get-togethers. It's not seen as rude or disrespectful.
- Costa Rican culture is very courteous, and confrontation and accusations are usually considered impolite.
- Do not begin eating your meal until you hear the host say "Buen Provecho".
- The knife is held in the left hand, and the fork in the right.
- Utensils are laid parallel to each other on the plate once you finish eating.
- 10% service fee is normally charged and considered the tip. Although feel free to leave a few extra bucks as 15-20% is becoming more standard.
