Prerequisites: Previous education in economics is helpful but not essential. Students are also

expected to have a basic understanding of calculus and statistics.

Course Description

Analysis of labor markets, utilizing economic theory and empirical techniques with applications to public policy. Topics include: investment in human capital; employee compensation issues; compensating wages; discrimination; unions; and institutions. Students will be expected to complete homework, one midterm, a paper proposal, peer edits, a paper presentation and an original final research paper related to labor markets.

Upon successful completion of this course, students will:

- 1. Have a deeper understanding of labor market concepts.
- 2. Understand and implement a range of analytical tools when studying these concepts.

Homework Assignments

There will be four homework assignments during the semester to be presented in class. You may work on the homework assignments together. Homework questions will be posted on Canvas one week before they are due. Late homework will not be accepted.

Midterm

There will be one midterm in this course. If a student must miss the exam, this should be discussed with me at least one week ahead of time. In the event of an emergency, students should email me immediately and provide documentation ASAP. Please note that if a student misses an exam and I have not accepted a student's excuse, a grade of "0" will be given. If the absence is excused, the weight of the missing exam will be distributed across the remaining course material. Students should bring Green Books for the exam. Calculators are not permitted.

Paper Proposal, Final Paper, and Presentation

As part of this course, each student will propose and submit a *research* paper on a subject related to labor economics. The final paper is due to me by email and to Turnitin on the day of the university scheduled final exam, **May 16**, and should run between 10 to 12 pages of text, double spaced, Times New Roman font, size 12, 1 inch margins in a Word Document (.doc or .docx). Tables and references do not contribute to the page count. In order to prepare for the final paper, you will submit a 1 page proposal to me by **March 1** stating the research question and hypothesis, data sources, methods, and five citations you plan to use (Canvas Template). I will then approve this proposal or require adjustments before you proceed. You do not have to wait until March 1 (and I recommend you don't!) to submit this proposal to me. The proposal operates on a PASS/FAIL basis. The first draft of your paper (minimum 5 pages) is due in class on **April 5**. You need to email me a copy to me and your peer edits partner *before* class so they have time to give you comments before peer edits are due the

week after. It is *your responsibility* to both make sure your peer edits partner has a copy of your paper *and* that you have a paper to work on. Peer edits partners will be posted on Canvas the week before. If you do not have a paper for peer edits by the deadline, you must alert me on April 5. You may find McCloskey and Greenlaw particularly helpful when writing the proposal and final paper.

You will also give a short ten minute presentation on your paper on the last day of class. Your paper must be submitted to me and to Turnitin by May 16 to receive credit.

Success in this course is based on the expectation that students will spend, for each unit of credit, a minimum of 45 hours over the length of the course (normally 3 hours per unit per week with 1 of the hours used for lecture) for instruction or preparation/studying or course related activities including but not limited to internships, labs, clinical practica. Other course structures will have equivalent workload expectations as described in the syllabus.
