Course Format

Technology Intensive, Hybrid, and Online Courses

This course adopts a completely online, asynchronous delivery format with no designated day/time meeting pattern. Reliable internet connectivity and a computer or laptop with webcam and microphone are required for the course. This course requires the use of Respondus for electronic proctoring of all exams.

Course Description

SJSU Catalog Description: Allocation of resources and distribution of income as affected by the workings of the price system and by government policies.

Further Description: Microeconomics studies the choice of individuals, firms, the government, and other organizations. The course will provide an introduction to the concepts and tools used by economists to analyze decisions made by individuals and firms who face limited resources.

Economics 1B is a general education course that meets the requirements for area D1, Human Behavior in the social science area. Students learn to apply microeconomic theory, to evaluate social information, draw upon different points of view, and formulate policy implications. Finally, students are able to place social events in an appropriate context. The GE writing requirement (1500 word minimum) will be satisfied by several writing assignments.

Achieve

Achieve contains course specific content and is integrated with Canvas for single sign-on access. Students are, at a minimum, required to have access to Achieve which includes an eBook. Students can choose to purchase a print text as well at an additional cost, but it is not required.

Respondus

This course requires the use of Respondus for electronic proctoring of all exams. For online exam proctoring, it **is necessary that your computer has reliable, high-speed internet connection**.
