Course Format

Course Description:

Development of advanced communication skills, both written and oral. Emphasis on writing formats used by criminal justice professionals. A scholarly paper, written in APA format and informed by research, will be required.

Course Requirements and Assignments

Practice Assignments (15 Points – 5 at 3 points each)

This course will cover specific content about the nature of social science writing in the American Psychological Association style as well as techniques useful for social scientific writing. There will be several practice assignments (mostly in the form of credit/no credit quizzes) that reinforce these.

Homework (9 Points – 3 at 3 points each)

As new ways to think about writing for the social sciences are covered, there will also be opportunities to generate your own writing to further hone these skills. This will allow for detailed feedback on assignments with somewhat lower stakes. This will also include assignments like doing an academic literature search.

Discussions (18 Points – 6 at 3 points each)

Throughout this course, students will be encountering new content from academic sources and need to digest them and their implications before writing about them. Because academic work does not exist in a vacuum, when there is new content or writing styles that bear discussion, instructor will assign you to discuss them with your peers. This will always include one new post in the discussion thread and two responses to others' posts. Eventually this will take the form of formal peer-review assignments.

Article Breakdowns (16 Points – 4 at 4 points each)

A critical piece of learning how to write for the social sciences in APA style is the treatment of peer-reviewed articles. Instructor will be providing four or five for each of four topic areas to facilitate learning about how to read peer-reviewed articles and write about them.

Rough Draft of Review Paper (12 Points)

Toward the end of the course students will be asked to put together a full draft of a literature review paper. This is so that first your peers and then then instructor can give detailed feedback. This will be graded on completeness.

Final Paper (30 Points)

This is the final paper and the culmination of all the skills students develop over this course. The entire purpose of this course is to be able to write an academic paper of this quality. It will be graded on all aspects of APA style, grammar, spelling, content, flow, coherence, the whole thing. A rough rubric and several example papers will be provided.

"Success in this course is based on the expectation that students will spend, for each unit of credit, a minimum of 45 hours over the length of the course (normally 3 hours per unit per week with 1 of the hours used for lecture) for instruction or preparation/studying or course related activities including but not limited to internships, labs, clinical practica. Other course structures will have equivalent workload expectations as described in the syllabus."
