We have had a strong 97-98 academic year filled with achievements by faculty, staff, and students. Current statistics represent 302 majors (221 Bachelors and 81 Masters), and course enrollments are at 410 Full-Time Equivalents (FTES).

In moving forward, we welcome a new Associate

Professor, Radesh Palakurthi, Ph.D., who will take the place of Dr. Ronald Usiewicz in Hospitality/Restaurant Management. Dr. Palakurthi brings to the Department extensive experience in restaurant management with expertise in computer and marketing applications. His most recent four-year academic assignment was at the University of North Texas. A doctorate earned at Pennsylvania State University rounds out his background.

We bid farewell and best retirement wishes to Don Betando, Founder of the Packaging Program at San José State University, who was honored with a plaque at the Department's Convocation Gelebration at the Hilton Hotel on May 23. Mr. Betando's commitment to academic excellence spans more than four decades at SJSU. Noteworthy, is his recent induction to the *Packaging Hall of Fame* by the Packaging Education Forum, October 1997.

Highlighting the Circle of Friends Annual Gala on April 16, was keynote and celebrity, Narsai David, KCBS Food and Wine Editor. We proudly announce that he was selected by the Circle to receive special recognition as the 1998 Distinguished Honorary Award Recipient. Narsai's career focus, with a specialization in culinary interests, parallels one of our goals to upgrade the food management systems/culinary laboratories in the Department. It is on the forefront of our fund-raising priorities this year. Donations will be tailored to purchase and install a state-of-the-art, professional heavy duty range with grill in the laboratory.

A major accomplishment to meet compliance requirements of The American Dietetic Association (ADA), involved completion of the Ten-Year, Self-Study document for the Didactic Program in Dietetics (DPD). Special acknowledgment is extended to all faculty and staff who contributed to the final, 400-page document,

while the primary writing leadership was instituted by Dr. Nancy Lu (DPD Director), Sandy Queen (graduate student) and myself. We can tout that our curriculum met the new ADA Foundation Skills and Knowledge requirements and that our high, Ten-Year DPD passage rate for the April 1998 RD Exam was 100% for both DPD and AP4!

Moving on to the Approved Preprofessional Practice Program (AP4), we have requested *Developmental Accreditation* status as a Dietetic Internship from The American Dietetic Association for our AP4. Dr. Kathryn Sucher (AP4 Director) will form a committee to begin to develop the Self-Study document required for the new dietetic internship (with an ADA due date in the year 2001).

Before closing, I would like to comment on the new Tri-Focus Newsletter logo, identifying Nutrition - Food Science - Packaging. Many of our alumni and friends have commented positively on the concept of pulling together the many exciting and varied facets of the Department that communicate new frontiers. The word, Nutrition, is inclusive of the Dietetics/Nutrition and Foodservice Management curriculum offered. These fields are closely aligned by similar core courses. Food Science refers to Food Technologists, Food Engineering, and the applied technology associated with the industry. (Additional chemistry, physics, math, and biology courses, but fewer Nutrition credits encompass this concentration.) Packaging, our latest program expansion, encompasses specific courses with a tailored curriculum of additional physics and math, with close alignment to Food Science and a few core Nutrition courses. We value your opinions and encourage your comments/suggestions regarding this new identity.

Thank you for your ongoing support. We continue to provide an excellent education for our students. Special thanks to Gretchen Vannice, Sandy Queen, Lorraine Chatterjee, Laura Hawkins, Dana Rogers, Judith Schallberger, and Caroline Fee, Circle of Friends Director, for creating this tremendous newsletter. 

He is so well known that his vast audience refer to him simply as "Narsai."

Narsai's extraordinary accomplishments include being recognized as one of the founders of California Cuisine. He truly defined this unique style of cooking, which is characterized by using the finest, fresh ingredients and preparing these in a light and vibrant manner. Some of his other accomplishments include authoring a cookbook, "Monday Night at Narsai's" and serving as Resident Chef on KTVU's "Mornings on 2", Television Chef Host on PBS "Over Easy", and Food Columnist for the San Francisco Chronicle.


CIRCLE OF FRIENDS TURNS UP THE HEAT!


- Completion of the Food Processing Laboratory

COLLEGE OF APPLIED SCIENCES & ARTS: AWARDS RECEPTION DEPARTMENT STARS ARE HONORED

The College of Applied Sciences and Arts honored four outstanding students and one outstanding alumna from the Department of Nutrition and Food Science in their annual Awards Reception, held May 4, 1998, in the campus University Room. Recipients and guests were welcomed by SJSU President, Dr. Robert Caret and Provost, Dr. Linda Bain.

Dr. Michael Ego, Dean of the College of Applied Sciences and Arts, presented a Dean's Undergraduate Scholarship award of \$500 to Melanie Haake (concentration in Dietetics). Kathleen Cahill received the award for Outstanding Graduate Research, titled "Vitamin C Status in Healthy People with Chronic Non-Progressive Physical Disabilities," which was presented by Terry Miller, Associate Dean. Dr. Nancy Lu, NuFS Faculty Advisor, presented the Small Research Grant award of \$300 to Yi-Ping Sun for her research on "The effect of different levels of high cholesterol diets on vascular endothelium and atherogenesis in rabbits."

Diane Hester, Director of Clinical Nutrition, UCSF Stanford Health Care, presented the UCSF Stanford Health Care Scholarship for Nutrition and Food Science to **Melanie Haake**. This yearly \$500 scholarship is funded by UCSF Stanford Health Care (formerly Stanford University Hospital) and given to an undergraduate dietetics student with outstanding academic achievements, service, and professional promise.

Mary Foley, M.S. candidate in Nutritional Science, received a \$1000 SJSU Alumni Association Scholarship. This award was presented by Terry Miller, Associate Dean.

To conclude the evening, Dr. Ego honored 11 SJSU alumni with Distinguished Alumni Awards. Mary Ellen Heising, M. A., Home Economics: Foods and Nutrition, 1978, and Founder, Second Harvest Food Bank, Santa Clara and San Mateo Counties, was among those honored for their extraordinary contributions to SJSU and their respective professions.

MARY ELLEN HEISING - AN INCREDIBLE CAREER HELPING HUNGRY PEOPLE

began her career path as a nutrition and home economics teacher in Minnesota. When her husband was transferred to California in 1975 (and her four children were raised), Mary Ellen decided to enroll at SJSU and get a master's degree in nutrition. Mary Ellen accomplished this goal, receiving her M.A. in Foods and Nutrition in 1978, when the major was under the Home Economics Department.

Little did she realize that the topic of her master's thesis, a study of the nutritional needs of the elderly, would begin her true mission. Upon graduation, Mary Ellen was asked by Economic and Social Opportunities (ESO), a federal government agency, to direct a brown bag program that provided bags of donated food to low income senior citizens. During her first year on the job, the program fed an average of 700 people per week at seven locations. (Today, this program feeds more than 10,000 per week at more than 60 locations).

In 1979, Mary Ellen became the founding Executive Director of the Second Harvest Food Bank. At this time, the Food Bank was 97 percent federally funded. By 1983, government financial support had disappeared. Many would have sadly accepted the situation, but not Mary Ellen! She used her innovative management skills to recruit food donors, volunteers, and industry support. She demonstrated remark-

able leadership skills inspiring teamwork, community involvement, and volunteerism.

The concept of food banking finally took hold as people began to understand how food banks serve as non-profit wholesalers, taking food donations from growers, processors, and retailers, then distributing the food to non-profit agencies that feed low income and hungry people.

As support for food banking grew, so did the Second Harvest Food Bank of Santa Clara and San Mateo Counties; it now has a \$3 million dollar budget and a 43 member staff. During Mary Ellen's term as Executive Director, from 1979-1995 (the year of her retirement), she directed capital campaigns and annually distributed 16 million pounds of food to over 120,000 low income people through a network of 380 churches and non-profit agencies.

Mary Ellen has received many prestigious awards including Woman of Achievement Award for Santa Clara County, Woman of the Year Award from the State of California Legislature, and the Outstanding National Food Bank Award. Most recently, she was honored with the 1998 Distinguished Alumni Award from the SJSU College of Applied Sciences and Arts, representing the Department of Nutrition and Food Science.


Mary Ellen Heising has had a truly remarkable career in public service and has earned the reputation as a community, state and national leader in non-profit food distribution for needy people. The Department of Nutrition and Food Science is indeed proud to have Mary Ellen as one of our very own alumni.

FACULTY FEATURE: MAY-CHOO WANG, Dr. P.H., R.D.

May-Choo Wang came to the Nutrition and Food Science Department at SJSU in Fall 1997 as Assistant Professor, specializing in community nutrition, nutrition education and research methodology. She has just completed one full year of teaching: engaging with students, dealing with office hours, writing exams, and experiencing all the other joys of teaching. May claims to have loved it all!

May was raised in Singapore and earned her first undergraduate degree in accounting at the National University of Singapore (B.Acc. '79). She worked as an accountant for a short while, but her love for people and nutrition soon led her to return to school. She got her M.A. degree in Nutritional Science at the University of Texas at Austin ('83). While in Texas she worked at the Texas Department of Health, where she was involved with program planning, grant writing, and data analysis.

May's intrigue with research and increasing interest in nutrition and epidemiology motivated her to complete a Master of Public Health/R.D. ('86) and later a doctorate in public health nutrition ('93) at the University of California at Berkeley. Her dissertation entitled, "Environmental (Cont'd pg. 5)

influences on growth and health in ethnic Chinese populations", was an investigation of obesity among ethnic Chinese youths.

Upon completion of her Dr. P.H., she was awarded a post-doctoral fellowship at the Stanford University School of Medicine by the National Institutes of Health. There, she was involved with a four-year longitudinal study of bone mineral acquisition in ethnically diverse children and adolescents. She has published in the areas of pediatric skeletal health and body composition, with a focus on dietary and ethnic influences.

Now at San Jose State University, she is pursuing her love of teaching and making a difference in the lives of students. In addition to her teaching and research activities, she participates in various committees and associations including the Research and Faculty Development Committee for the College of Applied Arts and

Sciences at SJSU, the local chapter of the California Dietetic Association (SJPDA) (where she is education liaison), and the Asia Pacific Public Health Nutrition Association of which she is a founding member.

May is also getting involved with the community of San Jose. She has been invited to sit on the Anemia Task Force for Santa Clara County and is very excited to have the opportunity to work with local public health professionals. She is also collaborating with Bruce Dreyfuss, M.D., of the Osteoporosis Center of San Jose, on a study of osteoporosis among South-East Asian women.

In sum, May is an incredibly talented, caring, and productive addition to the Department. She is truly a remarkable woman, as she finds time to engage in all her professional pursuits while she and her husband also raise their three young children and maintain their home in Palo Alto.

TRIBUTE TO DON BETANDO, FOUNDER, SJSU PACKAGING PROGRAM

Don Betando, Emeritus Professor and 1997 Packaging Hall of Fame inductee, was recently acknowledged with an honorary plaque for his role as Founder of SJSU's Packaging Program. The award was presented by Dr. Lucy McProud, NuFS Department Chair, at the 1998 Spring Convocation Ceremony held in the San Jose Hilton Hotel.

The event was shared by Kathy Betando (Don's wife), students, colleagues, and friends.

Don founded the SJSU Packaging Program in 1982; then, it was part of the Division of Technology. Even at the Program's inception, he demonstrated his innovative spirit by recruiting a prominent group of packaging entrepreneurs to act as an Industry Advisory Council.

In 1995, the Packaging Program merged with the Nutrition and Food Science Department. At that time, Don served in multiple roles to foster a smooth transition. He

worked closely with and provided mentor support to Dr. Jorge Marcondes, the new NuFS packaging faculty member, before handing him the reins as Packaging Coordinator. At the May Convocation Ceremony, Don expressed his gratitude to the Department for having the vision to incorporate the program.

Additionally, Don continued to broaden his base as development officer for the Packaging Program and to

champion the program, serving as industry liaison and consultant. He was personally responsible for securing thousands of dollars of donated equipment, student scholarships, awards, and grants.

Don has enjoyed an extraordinary career and leaves a legacy at SJSU, encompassing more than four de-

cades. True to his dedication to academic excellence, Don provided administrative leadership to the university as Director of the Division of Technology, Acting Associate Executive Vice President, Special Assistant to the Academic and Executive Vice Presidents, and Associate Dean in the College of Applied Sciences and Arts.

Don's many professional accomplishments include Western Packaging Association (WPA) President in 1993-94, WPA Packaging Man of the Year, 1987 (only five were ever given), and National Association of Industrial

Association of Industrial Technology President and Chairman of the Executive Board.

We salute Don Betando for his lifetime achievements; he has truly fostered the excellence of the packaging program and the entire university. We bid him success in his new endeavors.

MULTIDISCIPLINARY HEALTH PROMOTION IN LATER LIFE

This fall a new graduate level course (NuFS 298) was offered as a crosslisted class in the Nutrition and Food Science, Health Professions, and Gerontology programs. The course was team taught by Dr. Kathryn Sucher (NuFS Dept.) and Dianna Dee Bicocca (Nursing Dept.), and developed with the input of Dr. Debra David, (Gerontology Program Director).

Guest speakers from many disciplines (occupational therapy, nutrition and food science, nursing, human performance, and gerontology) provided timely health promotion information to the students. Topics included physiological, sociological, cultural, environmental, and spiritual factors that affect the length and quality of life in older adults.

Class projects included working in student teams, doing health assessments on elderly volunteers and then writing reports detailing assessment and care plans. Student teams also developed health promotion products and programs for use by local agencies. Some of the excellent work included developing nutrition education programs for the John XXIII Senior Nutrition Site, planning a senior exercise and fitness day at a local health club, and developing an information resource packet for the Monte Vista Terraces senior community.

This course exposes students to all areas of health promotion and the concept of working in health profession teams, as is the current trend in today's healthcare field. Further, it provides an opportunity to work with students and instructors from other disciplines as they learn principles of promoting health and preventing disability in later life.



SJSU ATHLETES WIN! NEW COURSE APPROVED

Nutritional Considerations for the Athlete (NuFS 081) is now a permanent one unit course offered by the Department of Nutrition and Food Science and taught by Helen DeMarco M.S. '96, R.D. This basic nutrition course is specifically designed for athletes who participate in any sport at SJSU. Course content is individualized, in that it varies with the needs of each athlete. Also, the course is held in the evenings for two hours, every other week, so that it does not interfere with practices and events.

As part of the class, students calculate their energy needs and then do a one day diet self-study to assess how their dietary intake compares to their calculated needs. These student athletes are truly motivated in optimizing their performance through sound nutritional practices and most often have questions about nutritional supplements and special diets.

Sarah Viaggi, B.S., '85

Sarah is a Registered Dietitian and Certified Diabetes Educator who serves as the sole dietitian of the San José/Good Samaritan Medical Group. Her job responsibilities include seeing 8 to 10

patients per day, as well as developing and presenting classes on topics such as decreasing fat consumption, carbohydrate counting, nutrition and diabetes, early post-op feeding, calcium needs and osteoporosis, and the food guide pyramid. She is currently developing a class on sodium.

Sarah attests that her education at SJSU gave her an excellent background and physiological knowledge base that has helped her to field unusual questions from patients and class participants with confidence. She describes herself as an interactive talker, not a speaker, this helps her respond to questions so people can learn what she has to offer.

Sarah's advice to current nutrition students is first, "Be versatile – don't tie yourself down in your first few years out in the work force" and second, "Take what is available – better jobs will follow." Above all, she recommends, "Follow your heart. Only you know what is best for you!"



Marisa Castaldini, M.S., '97

Marisa has accomplished much since graduation. She recently passed the RD Exam, and her master's project, "The Development and Pilot Testing of a Multimedia CD-ROM for Diabetes

Education." (Published in the May-June 1998 issue of Diabetes Educator.)

Marisa has also just been hired as a dietitian working for the Gardener Family Health Network. Marisa attributes her immediate success in finding a job to her involvement as editor of "News and Views," the newsletter of the San José Peninsula District of the California Dietetic Association.

In her new job as a dietitian, she most often sees clients dealing with Type II diabetes, weight control, and high cholesterol. Having developed expertise in diabetes education and counseling from personal experience and nutrition courses at SJSU, Marisa is presently accumulating hours necessary to become a Certified Diabetes Educator and studying to become a Certified Insulin Pump Trainer.

Commenting on memories of her student years, Marisa remarked, "Three weeks after graduation, my blood sugar was normal!" Marisa and her husband, Kevin, are expecting their first child in January 1999.

Jacci was an exceptionally productive graduate student. In addition to her academic studies, she worked at NASA for two years in the Regenerative Life Support Systems Department. Here, she

researched the benefits of plant derived nutrients on human metabolism. Nutrient dense vegetables were cultivated in the crop chamber on site, and Jacci devised menus for astronauts incorporating the harvested produce.

True to her passion for plants, Jacci completed her master's degree project evaluating the effectiveness of nutrition education in 16 San José community gardens. Presently, Jacci is involved in a very challenging and fulfilling AP4 experience at the VA Hospital in Palo Alto.


Alice Morris Swanson, M.S., RD., '84







A PERFECT MARRIAGE SAN JOSE MERCURY NEWS "DESIGNATED EATERS" AND SJSU NUTRITION STUDENTS

In what is sure to become an annual tradition, students of the Medical Nutritional Therapy 110A class agreed to undertake a project with Kathleen Donnelly, health and fitness writer for the San José Mercury News. This project entails the selection of six "designated eaters" chosen from interested Mercury News' readers. These lucky six get to have their present eating patterns analyzed. Based on their individual results, the "designated eaters" receive customized recommendations for eating a more healthful diet.

Accordingly, last November Ms. Donnelly selected 6 "designated eaters" from over 200 interested readers. Twenty-three students volunteered to participate in this real-life project, acting as personal nutritionists to the six clients.

Two meetings between the "designated eaters" and their personal student nutritionists were held. The first meeting was a "data collection" encounter where the clients turned in three-day food diaries, had their body composition analyzed by bioelectrical impedance, and answered food frequency questionnaires. This information was then analyzed by the students using Nutritionist IV software. The students processed all the data and designed individualized, well balanced eating plans. The results of the data collection were presented at the second meeting, as well as customized recommendations for healthier eating patterns.

The published articles that appeared in two January 1998 editions of the San José Mercury News attest to the success of the "designated eaters" project. This was truly a case of win-win. The clients received excellent and personalized nutrition counseling by committed nutrition students under the supervision of their professor, Dr.

Kathryn Sucher, who is also a registered dietitian. The students received an excellent opportunity to put the knowledge and skills learned throughout the semester into practice, as well as gain competence in the Nutrition Department's technological resources.

NUTRITION AND FOOD SCIENCE CLUB ACCOMPLISHMENTS A RECORD BREAKING YEAR!

The Nutrition and Food Science Club had a fantastic 1997-1998. They finished the academic year with 60 members, an increase of 35 percent over last year. The Club sponsored many professional development and fundraising events.

The Club arranged for excellent speakers to address the club members. Students had a wonderful opportunity to hear, first hand, the experiences and advice of a variety of professionals. Topics included: food science

production management, professional sales, internships and dietetics opportunities, sports nutrition, and community nutrition. Member support was at an all time high this year; in fact, many meetings were standing room only!

Several Club members represented the interests of young, upcoming dietetics professionals at the California Dietetic Association Legislation Day in May 1998 in Sacramento. Students presented legislators with packets of information intended to educate recipients about the profession of dietetics.

Club members also served as volunteer Student Ambassadors at the SJSU Circle of Friends Reception. They functioned to represent the NuFS Department to the guests who were invited from all areas of nutrition, food science, and food service. The guests were very impressed with the students, who added an incredible energy that contributed to the tremendous success of the event!

Fund raising events were very strong this year. The Nor Cal Institute of Food Technologies (NCIFT) Raffle raised nearly \$700 for the Club. Several prizes were donated to the raffle from local merchants including \$500 in merchandise from Hewlett Packard. Also, the Associ-

ated Students Spring Food Bazaar was a tremendous hit! Club members worked together to promote the Club and Department visibility while raising funds. Students prepared fresh strawberry shortcake and rice krispie treats in the department laboratory kitchens.

Other activities included selling aprons and t-shirts with the new Club logo from last year; in fact, these items were totally sold out. The Entertainment Book sales drive

was nearly 3 times as profitable as last year's effort. netting a profit of approximately \$250. Additionally, the Club sold California Dietetic Association (CDA) Cookbooks for the first time this year. Within 2 weeks 93 percent of the books were sold, earning the Club approximately \$140. Monies raised from all these efforts were used to provide travel scholarships for students attending national professional meetings and to offset department convocation expenses.

Community involvement was a major focus of the Club this year. In the fall semester,

the Club participated in the Harvest Festival, which celebrates the Garden Project at SJSU. The Club had a booth to promote Club visibility and distribute educational materials to Festival attendees. Spring semester efforts were focused on the first National Nutrition Month Celebration and Health Fair [see related article]. This was the largest, most successful Nutrition Month event held in recent SJSU history.

And finally, this year's Nutrition and Food Science Department graduating class was one of the largest ever. The Club sponsored the convocation ceremony that was attended by graduates, their families, and friends. Nearly 150 guests gathered to celebrate the glorious occasion!





Booths were festively decorated with balloons, streamers, informational posters and visual aids as well as printed materials made available to educate the campus community and increase awareness of nutrition related topics.

Each booth presented a different topic of nutrition.

Topics included Food Safety, Sports Nutrition, Body
Image and Eating Disorders, The Food Guide Pyramid,
Nutrition Quackery, and Eating on the Go. Club mem-

bers worked very hard in preparation for the big day.
Twenty-five Club members manned booths on the day of
the event, educating fellow students and distributing
valuable nutrition information.

In addition to the information topic booths, the Club invited representatives from the American Heart Association, the Diabetes Society, the Cancer Society, and the SJSU Fitness Event Center. Fair attendees were able to speak one-on-one with dietetics students and these professionals, pick up printed literature, and participate in free health screenings provided at the event.

Over 200 students had their body fat percentage tested, 85 had their blood glucose level screened, 50 participated in the blood pressure screening, and over 40 had their diets analyzed (by a senior or graduate level dietetic student) comparing the nutritional adequacy to the Food Guide Pyramid.

Also, contributing to the fun and festive nature of the National Nutrition Month Celebration, a drawing was held for over \$400 in prizes that were generously donated by local restaurants and merchants.
