This policy governs all such tools, including those released during our semester together. You may not use generative AI tools on assignments in this course. If you choose to use generative AI tools in violation of this policy (or in another class that permits them), please remember that they are typically trained on limited datasets that may be outdated. Additionally, generative AI datasets are trained on pre-existing material, including copyrighted material; therefore, relying on a generative AI tool may result in plagiarism or copyright violations. Finally, keep in mind that the goal of generative AI tools is to produce content that seems to have been produced by a human, not to produce accurate or reliable content; therefore, relying on a generative AI tool may result in your submission of inaccurate content. It is your responsibility—not the tool's—to ensure the quality, integrity, and accuracy of the work you submit in any college course. As specified elsewhere in the syllabus, this course will require electronic submission of essays, papers, or other written projects through the originality assessment service Turnitin. Turnitin will also attempt to detect AI-generated text. Moreover, I will ask the student to complete a similar assignment in class to verify authenticity. If you use generative AI tools to complete assignments in this course in ways that I have not explicitly authorized, I will apply the Code of Academic Integrity as appropriate to your specific case.

Depending on the specific circumstances, a first offense academic integrity violation related to misuse of generative AI could range anywhere from a warning to failing the course. Please act with integrity, for the sake of both your personal character and your academic record.
